Conditionality to other subjects: none

Course objectives: To enable students to gain: basic knowledge about the EU and European integration; to get acquainted with the basic EU institutions and the way they function; to understand the nature of EU law and its basic characteristics, as well as to study in detail all relevant sources of EU law.

Also, students will have the opportunity to learn how the EU internal market works and how the four basic freedoms are exercised: freedom of movement of goods, services, persons and capital. As the EU Founding Treaties only defined the four freedoms, special attention will be paid to the case law of the Court of Justice of the European Union, which in its judgments determined the content and nature of the four freedoms, as well as the scope and manner of their application.

Learning outcomes: After passing this exam, students will be able to recognize and describe the normative and institutional framework of the European Union; to understand the nature of EU law and its basic characteristics; to define the basic sources of EU law; analyze and explain the functioning of the EU internal market and the exercise of the four freedoms; analyze and explain the process of Montenegro's integration into the EU and the obligation to harmonize national law with EU law.
